

Retired CPA leads tax program, saves community \$81,450 and shares knowledge with the future generation

A few things are certain when it comes to describing Bea Aldrich – family, dedication, and taxes. Bea serves as Treasurer of our Board of Directors and has led the IRS's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program (VITA) as Gillespie County's Site Coordinator for 13 years, the last four of which were held at the Needs Council.

Soon after Bea became a Certified Public Accountant (CPA) 30 years ago, she realized her skills could help others and joined VITA as a tax preparer. "The name IRS scares people, they're so afraid they'll do something wrong," she said. "It's easy for me, I enjoy helping people and it's my way of giving back. God has been good to me and my family." VITA sites are rarely fortunate enough to have a Retired CPA as the site coordinator; Bea reviews and e-files every tax return, as well as recruiting and training volunteers, and handles all reporting with the IRS.

"All our tax volunteers are selfless and volunteer hundreds of hours to insure the entire program runs smoothly," she said. Her team of 14 volunteer tax preparers and client facilitators donated a combined 1,150 hours during the 11-week span of the tax program. "[The clients] trust us, I feel good about that," Bea said. "I know in my heart this site is run like a professional service. All of our volunteers are top notch!"

Those long hours could lead a volunteer to jump ship but not Bea; she is as dedicated as ever and always with a warm confident smile. When asked why she continues despite the challenges she responded with, "Most people are beaming when we hand them their taxes back which makes it all worthwhile."

The highly qualified group of volunteers who make this possible each year have a combined 70+ years of experience with the VITA program. This year, Riley Rizzo volunteered to assist as a client facilitator and learn from the group's wealth of experience "Most of our group are retired experience. "Most of our group are retired volunteers," Bea said. "It is so exciting to have a new person interested and an eager to learn, young professional."

"Not many people would be willing to let a high school student in on such an important process," she said. "I am interested in becoming a CPA so this opened my eyes to what it could really be like." "I am looking forward to learning more from her next year and taking on more responsibility."

It's hard to imagine Riley having time to volunteer as she is incoming President of Future Business Leaders of America,

When asked why she continues to volunteer despite her busy calendar her response was, "It's cool to see the impact it makes on so many people," she said. "Volunteering takes away the fairy-tale aspect of Fredericksburg – not everybody is wealthy."

Conversely, many in our community are barely making ends meet. Bea states, "It breaks my heart to see them pay to get their taxes done, when that couple hundred dollars could pay for food or an electric bill." VITA calculates \$225 per return in savings; 362 returns were processed resulting in \$81,450 saved in our
